IB Update

The May 2014 IB exam results are in, and West High School students did very well! Twenty-two students successfully earned the IB Diploma (79%), and 73 students earned IB Certificates (73% of Certificate students earned a 4 or higher on their exam). Congratulations to all of the IB students! The class of 2015 has 20 Diploma candidates and 68 Certificate students. The class of 2016 has 30 Diploma candidates and 112 certificate students.

Registration for the 2015 exam session will begin soon. The registration fee for any student taking an exam (\$157) is due on September 15. Registration forms will be due to Ms. Bast by October 1.


Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT)

Freshmen, sophomores and juniors who wish to take the PSAT should sign up in the Student Services Office by October 1, 2013. The cost of the test is \$20.

There are three good reasons to take the PSAT:

- 1. It's good practice for the SAT 1
- 2. It's the first step for juniors to enter the National Merit Scholarship competition
- 3. It allows students to receive information from colleges that have programs similar to each student's interests
 Freshmen are also encouraged to take the test for practice.



Test application materials are available in the guidance office. Seniors are encouraged to take the ACT and/or SAT before the winter 2014 holiday break.

Welcome to West's FReshman ACademy

I. Third Year of Implementation

The Freshman Academy has been created to ensure that all Freshman students achieve their fullest potential. The Freshman Academy has seen tremendous growth in academic success in its three years of existence. In the academy's first year, 2012-13, the success rate

rose from 73% to 91%. Last year it rose to 94%. The current goal is to have a 95% success rate. The Freshman Academy teachers and administrators have formed an SLC (Small Learning Community) to ensure that students are getting the required support needed to achieve their greatest potential. The SLC collaborates weekly to guarantee that students are thinking critically, collaborating, utilizing proper communication skills through speech and writing, and maintaining focus on academics.



II. Student Recognition

Every grading period there will be two lists, entitled the Dean's List and Academy Achievers, posted in the freshman hallway by Mr. Myer's office. The Dean's List will contain the names

of students who are making all A's and B's in the corresponding grading period; the Academy Achievers list will display the names of students who are passing all their classes. These lists are presented to recognize students who are working hard and to motivate all students to do their best. The students really seem to enjoy it when they can see their names on the recognition wall.



III. Academic Support

All freshman teachers have designated tutoring times. There are morning sessions and afterschool sessions available for students who want to receive tutoring. However, if students want to receive tutoring in the morning, they are required to ask the teacher for a pass. The Freshman Counselor, Mrs. Roberts, and her intern, Iesha Williams, are also available to help students who need academic coaching, college and career planning, or

personal/social support. As a Professional School Counselor, Mrs. Roberts' mission is to make sure all students are achieving, carrying themselves with dignity and self-worth, receiving a quality education, and receiving the support and guidance of caring, knowledgeable, and skilled adults throughout their educational experience. Therefore, students are encouraged to seek help from Mrs. Roberts if needed. Parents are also encouraged to communicate with the School Counselor in order to ensure that their child is receiving everything they need to be successful individuals.

IV. Family Engagement Night

The Family Engagement Night events are held in order to build supportive relationships between parents of ninth graders in the Freshman Reading course at West High School. This reading class is designed to help students strengthen their reading skills in hopes that they will be successful in other courses as well. The first event held for Family Engagement Night was a huge success! Over half of the families who RSVP'd were in attendance. We had 21 families, with a total of 59 West High students and family members. A WHS parent, Ms. Jack, treated us to a beautiful song and spoke to parents about the importance of partnering with their student's school faculty to ensure their student's success. Surveys were given out to parents and students. The collected data showed that 98% of parents and 100% of students enjoyed the event. Dead End BBQ catered the event, and special thanks go to the PTSO for helping to fund this successful Family Engagement Night.

The West High School Foundation (WHSF) kicked off its fall campaign, West 365, during West Fest. West 365 asks, "Can you give \$1 a day for West High School?" The money raised from this campaign will help provide the vital funds the foundation needs to fulfill incoming teacher grant applications and computer technology commitments for the fall semester. As an organization, we simply could not continue our work without this income.

During West's Open House, I was able to share some of what I learned from attending the Tennessee School Foundation Conference in August. The school foundation phenomenon started on the West Coast and has swept across the nation. The number of school foundations in Tennessee has grown from around 40 to over 100 in the past 10 years. Foundations allow individual school communities to provide the extra funds necessary to enable teachers and administrators to raise the quality of their children's education as well as to have a voice in what they would like to see in education today.

The boys' cross country team looks to continue to build on the momentum it acquired over the previous two seasons. After a strong fourth place showing at the Region 2 AAA meet last fall, the team aims for a berth at the TSSAA meet in Nashville on November 1. The competition will prove difficult, with Hardin Valley Academy, Oak Ridge, and Farragut returning with strong squads as well.

The Rebels' All-State Jackson Schmid graduated in May. Returning juniors Adam Johnston and Bruce Boles are coming off very strong sophomore track campaigns. Both set new personal records and showed that they are ready to compete with the best in the state on the course. Seniors Nick Jernigan and Nick Woo will need to close any gaps in the scoring five in order to prove that West has one of the top squads in the region. Ben Welsh and Joe Eapen, both juniors, will need to step up and contribute in the Rebels' top seven. Sophomores Graham Sullivan and Jordan Bowser will step in after a solid summer of training. Newcomers are plenty this fall. Fletcher Kress, Isaac New, William Yates, Caleb Wood, Michael Patrick, and Harrison Siegling will make for a deep squad.

The girls' cross country team, which finished seventh at Region 2AAA, returns all its finishers and adds a few new faces. Junior Megan Murray, who will be one of the top runners in the state, will lead the team this fall. She comes off a very successful sophomore track season that saw her gain a coveted spot on the start line in the 1600 meters at the outdoor TSSAA meet in Murfreesboro. The team's lone senior, Grace Cecil, will continue her steady progress, which has made her a key member of the girls' team over the previous two seasons. Junior Evora Kreis, having had her strongest summer of training yet, will show that she is as strong as any runner on the course this fall. Another junior, Dyana Metheny, back after taking last fall off because of injury, will hopefully be able to pick up where she left off as a freshman. Sophomores Rainey Bartram and Lindsey Stallworth now have a year of training, and both will give West a formidable scoring five. A transfer from West Virginia, Megan Jepson, and freshman Ellery Jernigan have displayed the hard work and dedication that a cross country runner needs. Both continue to improve on a daily basis and to show understanding of the team's training process and system.

YOUR JUNIOR YEAR:

WEST HIGH SCHOOL

Your Year-by-year Guide to Being Prepared for College

YOUR FRESHMAN YEAR:

Take challenging classes and work hard to make good grades. Your GPA (grade point average) is cumulative and starts now! Know your graduation requirements.
Honors, AP (Advanced Placement), IB (International Baccalaureate) and Dual Enrollment courses will prepare you for college level work, and will prove to colleges that you are willing to work hard. Ask your school counselor to explain the requirements and benefits of these courses.
Begin exploring the many different types of postsecondary schools including 2 year and 4 year, public and private, technical and professional schools, women's and Historically Black Colleges and Universities.
Create a file of important documents in preparation for creating your resume.
Explore your interests through clubs, volunteering and sports. Take an interest survey and explore careers on Tennessee Career Information Delivery System (tcids.com).
Ask your teacher about what you need to do all year to be ready for EOC (End of Course) Exams that count 25% of your grade.
Develop study, organizational, and time management skills. If you need help ask your school counselor, teachers, and parent/guardian.
Take advantage of before and after school study sessions and ask your teachers about online study resources.
Consider taking the PSAT in October as practice. Ask your counselor if you qualify for a fee waiver.
Enroll on CollegeforTN.org to track your academic progress, and do research on colleges, financial aid, careers and more!
College is expensive, but more than half of college students get some type of financial aid such as grants and scholarships.
Attend the Smoky Mountain Regional College Fair in October.
Attend Knox County Schools Annual Career Day Feb. 23 to visit displays and talk to employers and college representatives.
Meet with your school counselor in the spring to talk about next year's schedule. Make sure that you sign up for courses that you need to prepare for AP and IB courses.
Summer: Use the summer to attend academic enrichment camps and workshops, and read, read, read!

YOUR SOPHOMORE YEAR:

Talk to your school counselor and parents about Honors, AP and IB courses. There are many ways that taking rigorous courses now will pay off in the long run!
