

2016-17 TNReady Item Types

ELA (Grades 3–8 and all End-of-Course assessments)

Multiple choice: These are items with four answer options, only one of which is correct.

Evidence-based selected response (EBSR): These are items with two parts, A and B. They ask students to choose the textual evidence in Part B that supports the correct answer in Part A. Students cannot receive credit for part B without selecting the correct answer for part A. EBSR items are the only item types in ELA for which students can receive partial credit. A student earns two points by answering both Parts A and B correctly. A student earns one point by answering Part A correctly even if he or she misses Part B. A student earns zero points if he or she answers Part B correctly but misses Part A.

Multiple select: These are items with more than four answer choices with multiple correct responses. This item type asks students to demonstrate a nuanced understanding of a text. In ELA, the number of correct answers will always be identified (e.g., “Select the two correct answers”).

Writing prompt: This item type asks students to write a multi-paragraph response to 1-3 stimulus text(s). The prompt is unique to each passage or passage set. The prompt is aligned to one of three writing standards (W1, W2, W3), and its verbiage explicitly indicates which mode students should respond in (i.e., argument/opinion, informational/explanatory, or narrative). For detailed descriptions of the modes, please refer to any of the ELA assessment blueprints ([here](#)). Students will complete one writing prompt.

Editing task: This item type consists of a short passage that contains embedded errors. Each error is underlined in the passage. These sections of underlined text reappear as individual multiple choice items for which the student is asked to select the correct

revision. In some cases, the underlined text may not contain an error. In those instances, students would select “No change needed” as the correct answer.

Math (Grades 3–8 and all End-of-Course assessments)

Multiple choice: These are items with four answer options, only one of which is correct.

Multiple select: These are items with more than four answer choices with multiple correct responses. Sometimes the number of correct responses will be indicated (e.g. “Choose the two correct answers”), but sometime the number of correct responses will not be indicated (e.g. “Select all of the correct answers”).

Fill in the blank: Students must provide their mathematical solution to a problem. No written explanation is required. These are currently hand scored.

Integrated items: These are multipart, 4–6 point questions that ask students to assimilate information from multiple grade-level domains. They may require background knowledge from previous grades.

Two-part items: These are items with two parts, A and B, worth a total of two points. These are scored in two different ways depending on their type.

Type 1: The two parts of these items work independently of one another, and they are scored independently. Students can get one point for getting only part A correct, one point for only getting part B correct, or two points for getting both parts A and B correct.

Type 2: The two parts of these items are dependent on one another. These occur when students must use their answer from part A to create their answer for Part B. If a student misses part A but uses their answer correctly to solve part B, they would get one point for their part B answer.

Graphing: Students will be asked to provide a graphical representation. These may be on a number line or on a coordinate plane depending on the grade level. These are currently hand scored.

Matching table: These items are tables where students are asked to match what appears on each row of a table with a correct response located in the columns of the table.

Science (3–8 and all End-of-Course assessments)

Multiple choice: These are items with four answer options, only one of which is correct.

U.S. History and Geography End-of-Course

Multiple choice: These are items with four answer options, only one of which is correct.

Writing prompt: This item type prompts students to write a multi-paragraph response to one to three sources. These sources could include: maps, timelines, graphics, primary source documents, and/or informational texts. The prompt is unique to each set of source(s) and is aligned to a U.S. history and geography standard. Students are asked to draw on content knowledge as well as knowledge from the sources. Students will complete one writing prompt.

Please note, there is not an operational social studies assessment for grades 3-8 this year.

Grade 2 Optional Assessment

Grade 2 Math

Grade 2 ELA

Writing prompt: Students will respond to two prompts, and they will be asked to write 3–4 sentences per prompt (aligned to standard W8) based upon information from a passage/text. One prompt will be in response to a literary passage, and one prompt will be in response to an informational passage.

Fluency: This is an item where students’ reading fluency and comprehension will be assessed through the use of **yes** or **no** responses to independently read sentences containing second grade vocabulary.

Listening: These are items that assess listening comprehension skills by asking students to listen as a sentence or short passage is read aloud and then choose one picture or text response to answer the question.
