THE CELEBRATION OF THE 100TH **ANNIVERSARY OF WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE CONTINUES**

As you know, this year marks the 100th anniversary of women winning the right to vote. In August 1920, Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the 19th Amendment, and with ratification, more than 27 million women across the nation gained the right to vote.

GOVERNOR'S CIVICS SEAL

Governor Bill Lee recently announced the "Governor's Civics Seal" that recognizes schools and districts that prioritize teaching our nation's history and civic values. Along with the announcement of the program, Governor Lee allocated \$500,000 to support public schools and districts implementing high-quality civic education programs that result in readiness for college, career, and civic life.

How does this impact your school?

Share and encourage your staff and students to participate – beginning with the Social Studies Department.

Requirements to be recognized as a Civics All Star School:

- 1. Incorporate civics learning across a broad range of grades and subjects (at least two grades and contents). Lesson plans are available.
- 2. Provide instruction on the democratic process, principles, practices, events, people and the formation of federal and state government using federal and state documents.
- 3. Provide professional development for teachers (civics workshops, etc.).
- 4. Students engage in a real world learning activities (mock election, essay contest, etc.).
- 5. Have a fully implemented project-based assessment
- 6. Receive the All Star Civics recognition this is based on your senior class scoring 85% or higher on the Civics test. *this is for high schools only

UPCOMING PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

5 ELEMENTS OF A COMPLETE SOCIAL STUDIES LESSON

When constructing a lesson the teacher should incorporate the **practices** in their planning and consider the following:

- Begin with an engaging activity that allows students to make connections to prior knowledge/previous learning.
- Allow students to <u>explore</u> resources and materials to share a common learning experience.

(SSP.01. SSP.02, SSP.03)

 Plan time for students to <u>explain</u> what they explored, share their learning and takeaways, etc. Provide clarification where necessary.

SSP.01, SSP.03, SSP.04, SSP.05, SSP.06 possibly)

- Push students to <u>elaborate</u> and <u>expand</u> their understandings – this can be written and/or verbalized. (SSP.04)
- Finally, <u>evaluate</u>
 (formatively) and provide feedback to assess their understandings.
