

1. What is your Thread/Idea/Concept? What will your common theme be for your show? Think of it as your “why”? All of the final pieces will need to relate in some way.
2. Come up with 10 project ideas and the materials you will need. Yes, you are only required 8-11, but we need to show up and show out. Show the viewers and IB your crazy amazing talents.
3. Begin sketching ideas and be ready to begin two projects. If you are HL, feel free to utilize summer freetime to start working on a piece, but be sure to document.
4. Review your Comparative Study. If they don't make sense with your chosen thread, find two different artists that relate to your work in some way. The artists need to be VERY different, but have something that connects them. I will be reviewing criteria A-D (refer to the beginning of your slides) the last two weeks in July, so if you want to make changes, do so before July 15th.
5. Bring all things below with you on the **first day of class**. They can be a Google Slides in your drive
 - A sentence or two explaining your **WHY** for your thread next year.
 - A list of 10 possible projects along with necessary materials
 - Sketches of the 10 possible projects
 - Comparative study criteria A-D

Make sure you are available: March 24th - 26th for the art show. If you already know you have a conflict with those dates, let me know asap.

How you will be graded in Aspen and for IB next year is on the back. Absolutely reach out with any questions.

Art-Making forms = 40%

This will be your show and you will have to create a space in which your pieces work together.

SL: 4-6 completed Art Works (full researched and practiced in process portfolio)

HL: 8-10 completed Art Works (full researched and practiced in process portfolio)

Process Portfolio = 40%

SL: 9-18 screens which show sustained experimentation, exploration, manipulation, and refinement of at least one art making media. (see chart below)

HL: 13-25 screens which show sustained experimentation, exploration, manipulation, and refinement of at least one art making media. (see chart below)

Comparative Study = 20%

SL: 10-15 screens which examine and compare at least 3 artworks, at least 2 should be by different artists. The work selected for comparison and analysis should come from very different contexts (local, national, international, dead, alive, man, woman, painting, sculpture, etc.)

HL: 10-15 screens which examine and compare at least 3 artworks, at least 2 should be by different artists. The work selected for comparison and analysis should come from very different contexts (local, national, international, dead, alive, man, woman, painting, sculpture, etc.) For this level you MUST also include how these artists inspired your work this year. It MUST be evident in your works.
