

Knox County Schools FY14 budget proposal unanimously approved by Board

On Tuesday, April 9, Knox County Schools' Board of Education unanimously approved the proposed <u>budget for FY14</u> presented by Dr. Jim McIntyre, Superintendent of the Knox County Schools for a total of \$419,867,000. Knox County Mayor Tim Burchett is scheduled to present his budget on May 1, 2013, while Knox County Commission is likely to vote on the county's overall budget during its June 6 meeting.

The Knox County Schools FY14 budget focuses on additional, targeted investment in four key priorities:

- Enhancing Educator Compensation ("teachers")
- o Combined pay increase of 2.5% for teachers, increase of 1% for classified employees, \$1.27 million to support strategic compensation (APEX), middle and high school principals moved to year-round contracts, step increases for certified (licensed educators) and classified (custodians, instructional aides, secretaries, etc.) personnel
- Sustaining Instructional Improvement Initiatives ("teaching")
- o Continuing support for critical educational initiatives: early literacy efforts, teacher supports and professional development, teacher leadership roles such as instructional coaches and lead teachers, magnet and community schools, interventions and tutorial services, and academic enrichment for students.
- Facilitating Personalized Learning Supported by Technology ("technology")

 Instructional technology can allow teachers to better personalize and
 differentiate their instruction, and enables educators to continuously and
 seamlessly adapt their teaching to meet the unique needs of their students. The
 Knox County Schools has begun a 1:1 technology effort (one technology device for
 each one student, and each one teacher) at 11 schools across the school system
 through the School Technology Challenge competition.
- Bolstering Student Safety Efforts ("safety")
- o Implementation a foundational level of school security resources at every school, including a current-generation video camera system, a school access control strategy, and an armed, uniformed School Resource Officer or School Security Officer at each school.

High School Summer School

Does your high school student need to make up a class that they received a "C" or lower in? If so, Summer School can help them make up a full-unit grade.

Students in Knox County High Schools have the opportunity to make up a full-unit grade in <u>summer school</u> by attending class Tuesday, May 28, 2013 through Tuesday, July 23, 2013 from 8:30 a.m. to 12:30 p.m. for subjects that they received a "C" or lower in. The deadline for high school students to register for summer school provided at <u>Fulton High School</u> is Friday, May 3, 2013. Summer Bridge helps freshmen master academic skills

Knox County Schools, in partnership with the <u>Great Schools</u> <u>Partnership</u>, supports the



Summer Bridge program that helps rising ninth graders with academic skills that are essential for high school success. Last year, the program helped 91 percent of 267 students achieve mastery of essential concepts in reading/language arts and mathematics. It is an eight-week program designed for selected rising ninth grade students, who have failed reading/language arts and mathematics in eighth grade. Additionally, the program is designed to meet the needs of students who have not demonstrated proficiency on TCAP tests.

Rising freshman, who are selected to participate in the program, will be notified no later than Tuesday, April 30, 2013. This Summer Bridge program will begin on Monday, June 3, 2013 and conclude on Friday, August 2, 2013 with a one week recess. School hours are from 8:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. For more information, contact the Knox County Schools Secondary Education office at (865) 594-1710.

Because of its success, additional funding provided by the Great Schools Partnership will pilot a Knox County Elementary Summer Bridge Learning Academy for rising sixth grade students to have an opportunity to demonstrate growth of the essential concepts and skills which are necessary for middle school success.

The Knox County Elementary Summer Bridge will be held Monday, June 3 through Tuesday, July 16 from 8:30 a.m. to 11:30 a.m. Rising sixth grade students will be selected to participate in the program based on their third and fourth grade TCAP tests. The secon d annua l Let's Move! Knox ville e vent will be held on Satur day,




