


2017 Farragut High School Summer Reading

March: Book One

Genre: Fantasy (dystopian)

Synopsis: This groundbreaking graphic novel provides a first-person account of the Civil Rights Movement from key figure John Lewis. The Nashville Student Movement is portrayed, giving this book a local angle. This book is the first in a trilogy. It was named a Coretta Scott King Honor Book and was named an Outstanding Book for the College Bound.

Potentially Controversial Content: racial slurs from bigoted characters and in the context of nonviolent resistance training, language in the same context, depiction of Bloody Sunday and murder of Emmett Till, depiction of Inauguration Day 2009, religious viewpoint, depiction of killing chickens for supper, bigotry and racism, other violence from the time period, author is current U.S. Representative



Red Queen

Synopsis: Fans of *The Hunger Games* and *The Selection* will enjoy this dystopian novel. "In a world divided by blood--those with common, Red blood serve the Silverblooded elite, who are gifted with superhuman abilities--seventeen-year-old Mare, a Red, discovers she has an ability of her own. To cover up this impossibility, the king forces her to play the role of a lost Silver princess and betroths her to one of his own sons. But Mare risks everything and uses her new position to help the Scarlet Guard--a growing Red rebellion--even as her heart tugs her in an impossible direction." -Follett **Potentially Controversial Content:** bigotry and violence of a dystopian world, drinking at social functions (only by characters who are of age,) some kissing, characters with supernatural powers, some language



Between Shades of Gray



Synopsis: "In 1941, fifteen-year-old Lina, her mother, and brother are pulled from their Lithuanian home by Soviet guards and sent to Siberia, where her father is sentenced to death in a prison camp while she fights for her life, vowing to honor her family and the thousands like hers by burying her story in a jar on Lithuanian soil." -Follett This book was written by a Tennessee author who is Lithuanian-American, telling the little known story of what happened to her people during World War II.

Potentially Controversial Content: oppression/humiliation and genocide of Lithuanian people, brutality of Soviet soldiers, sexual innuendo, kissing, horrors of war, gulags, and genocide (including character being groped and adult character forced into prostitution)



The Alchemyst: Secrets of the Immortal Nicholas Flamel by Michael Scott


Genre: Fantasy

Potentially Controversial Content: mild fantasy violence, magic




Hollow City: The Second Novel of Miss Peregrine's Peculiar Children by Ransom Riggs

Four-Four-Two



Potentially Controversial Content: racial slurs during WWII, violence/horror of war




The Rule of Thoughts

Potentially Controversial Content: mild language, some violence




The Boys in the Boat (Young Readers Adaptation) by Daniel James Brown
