WHAT IS COLLEGE?

What comes to mind when you hear the word college?

College is any school that a student enrolls in after receiving their high school diploma or GED that offers a certificate or degree for completing courses.

TYPES OF DEGREES

- Diploma and Certificate: take less than a year to two years to complete and focus on a specific skill or career. (example: Tennessee Colleges of Applied Technology aka TCAT)
- Associate's Degree: two-year degrees offered at community colleges (example: Pellissippi State Community College, Walter's State, etc.)
- Bachelor's Degree: four-year degrees offered at public and private four-year colleges and universities (example: UTK, South College, & CNU)

Private and Public 4-Year Colleges

4-year colleges and universities offer bachelor degree programs.

- <u>Public Colleges:</u> funded by local and state governments and usually offer lower tuition rates than private colleges, especially for students who are residents of the state where a college is located. Public colleges in Tennessee include the University of Tennessee System, such as University of Tennessee- Knoxville, as well as Middle Tennessee State University and East Tennessee State University.
- <u>Private Colleges:</u> schools that rely mainly on tuition, fees and private sources of funding. Private colleges in TN include Carson-Newman, South College, Belmont University, Johnson University, and many more.

Paying For College

 Developing a plan to pay for college can feel overwhelming. Fortunately for students in Tennessee, there are many options available to help reduce the cost of attending college, including:

Preparing for College in 9th Grade

It's never too early to start preparing for college!

- Get to know your School Counselor!
- Take challenging courses
- Begin working toward earning EPSO credits
- Grades, Grades, Grades!
- Put effort into extracurricular activities
- Research colleges/careers (YouScience)
- Take advantage of Summer Break
 - Volunteer, Academic Support, Employment, etc.

How do I earn EPSOs?

- Doing well on ASVAB
- 21> on the ACT
- Earn an Industry Certification
- Taking a Dual Enrollment course
- Taking an AP class and sitting for the exam, etc.

Preparing for College in 10th Grade

- Continue or start to take challenging courses
- Grades, Grades, Grades!
- Put effort into extracurricular activities
- Continue researching colleges/careers
- Apply for Governor's School
- **If you want to play Division I or II sports in college, start the certification process and check with your School Counselor to make sure you're taking a core curriculum that meets NCAA requirements.**

Preparing for College: 11th Grade Fall Semester

- Take the Preliminary Scholastic Aptitude Test (PSAT)
- Decide what type of education you want to pursue after high school
- Make a list of schools you are interested in and discuss with your family
- Explore careers and their earning potentials (YouScience)
- Stay on track with your classes and grades
- Create an appropriate email address if you don't already have one. *Get in the habit of checking it regularly.

Preparing for College: 11th Grade Fall Semester

- Figure out when you'll be taking important tests like the ACT, SAT, SAT Subject Tests, and AP exams, and mark the dates on your calendar
- Stay involved with extracurricular activities
- Start looking at financial aid information and scholarships
- Start applying for scholarships that allow you to apply as a junior; note deadlines on calendar
- Start/Continue visiting colleges
- Apply for Governor's School
- Talk to your School Counselor about early postsecondary opportunities such as dual enrollment

Preparing for College: 11th Grade Spring Semester

- Apply for a summer job or internship in fields you're interested in pursuing after high school
- When researching schools, use a school's net price calculator, which is located on the institution's website, to get a personalized estimate of what that school will cost your family
- Ask seniors what advice they'd give on the college process

Preparing for Senior Year

Senior year of high school is a busy and exciting time!

In addition to being the leaders of Gibbs High School, you will also be taking the next steps towards college and your career.

Jumpstart Your College Search Over the Summer

- Go on college visits.
- Narrow down your colleges being considered.
- Start thinking about which teachers you would like to write letters of recommendation for you.
- Use your list of activities you've participated in (volunteer experiences, honors and awards) since 9th grade and create a resume (YouScience, SCOIR).
- Work on your college application essays.
- Think about engaging in a meaningful activity such as community service or travel.

Jumpstart Your College Search Over the Summer

- Review the application procedures for schools you plan to apply to. Write down and keep track of deadlines!
- Start thinking about if you're going to apply early decision or early action to any schools. This process typically begins earlier. If you plan to apply early decision to any school, take the time to visit the school again and make sure you're willing to commit.
- Get advice from other college students.
- Read a variety of books and magazines and review your math skills over the summer. This will help you to prepare for the ACT and/or SAT if you plan to take it in the fall.

Preparing for College: 12th Grade Fall Semester

- Double check all college application deadlines and requirements.
- If you're applying early decision or early action, those deadlines are often between October 1st and November 1st.
- Give any recommendation forms to appropriate teachers and counselors.
- Send your official ACT or SAT test scores to the colleges where you're applying. Retake ACT or SAT early if you want to try to raise your score.
- Submit your college applications! Look for your school's College App Week!
- Request transcripts and letters of recommendation at least two weeks prior to application deadlines.

Preparing for College: 12th Grade Fall Semester

- Complete your FAFSA as close to October 1st as possible.
- Look for your local FAFSA Frenzy events if you need help completing the FAFSA.
- Work on scholarship applications and pay attention to deadlines.
- Check with the financial aid offices of the colleges you're applying to for other scholarship opportunities.
- Consider which school is the best social, academic, and financial fit for you.
- Choose the college you want to attend!

ACT and SAT Prep

- Juniors take ACT Prep during enrichment
- ACT and SAT Websites some offer free help and others charge a small fee:
 - o number2.com
 - o freetestprep.com
 - kaptest.com Kaplan offers a free online ACT or SAT practice test with a score review; other free resources like webinars
 - act.magoosh.com charges a fee for ACT Prep; free apps
- Google ACT and SAT Prep in Knoxville for live classes

FAFSA

- Free Application for Federal Student Aid
- The FAFSA is an online form that uses a student and their family's information to help calculate how much financial aid a student qualifies for
 - Federal programs: Pell grant, subsidized student loans, work study
 - State programs: Tennessee Promise, Hope Scholarship and more!

Most colleges also use the information on the FAFSA to calculate financial aid.

FAFSA

- Available October 1st
- www.fafsa.gov (VERY IMPORTANT!)
- <u>Student AND parent will create</u> FSA ID usernames/passwords (fsaid.ed.gov) to sign electronically
- Student and parent will submit FAFSA using IRS Data Retrieval Tool to upload prior year's tax information

Tennessee Promise

Apply to the Tennessee Promise program at www.TNPromise.gov by November 1

- Complete the FAFSA at www.FAFSA.gov by February 1st
- Attend spring mandatory meeting as coordinated by your county's partnering organization
- Complete 8 hours of community service between November 2 - July 1

*dates subject to change- must be approved at TSAC's board meeting in spring of each semester
