Class Expectation/Rules

- 1. Always arrive on time.

Bathroom Passes

Projects

Biography Research Project

We will be using books from the "Who was..." (Penguin Publisher) series as the basis of our research. These are biographies that are written in a narrative (story) format. Students may choose from the teacher's collection or buy a book on a person of their choice. These books retail for \$5.99 and can be found at McKay's, Books-A-Million, Barnes & Nobles, and Amazon.

Gothic Texts

Gothic literature capitalizes on topics and themes that most teens find interesting and relatable.

The term **Gothic Fiction** refers to a style of writing that is characterized by elements of fear, horror, death, and gloom, as well as romantic elements, such as nature, individuality, and very high emotion. These emotions can include fear and suspense.

Dystopias

A **dystopia** is a society (often set in the future) that is characterized by things such as mass poverty, public mistrust and suspicion, a police state or oppression. Most authors of dystopian fiction explore at least one reason why things are that way, often as an analogy for similar issues in the real world.
