


STANLEY'S SECTION~

A+ Attendance

The first step toward doing well in school is to show up! As the school year continues, encourage your child to keep up good attendance with these tips.

- Set expectations. Weave comments into your conversations that make it clear how important you consider attendance. ("I scheduled your dentist appointment for 3:30pm so you won't miss anything in 7th period science.")
- Know school policy. If your middle grader misses school because he's sick, us the policy to help you decide when he can return. For instance ,if he has been fever –free for the required amount of time and feels better, he could go back to school.

Attention Parents of Rising 7th Graders:

Make your appointment now for 7th grade vaccinations!

Rising 7th graders are required to have a Tdap and the 2nd Varicella vaccination prior to the start of 7th grade. This includes all in-person <u>AND</u> virtual learners. Vaccinations must be documented on a TN Department of Health Certificate of Immunization form and submitted to the school office. If a student is exempt from receiving vaccinations due to a medical reason, a parent/guardian shall provide a note from the medical provider. If a student is exempt from receiving vaccinations due to religious beliefs, the parent/guardian must provide a written statement.




