Hello, students!

First things first, I can't wait to see you in August (be it in our classroom or online)! I will be your English teacher along with a teacher's assistant. It should not surprise you that I love reading. I hope that I can help you like it at least a *little* more than you already do. I have a lot to tell you, but I'll keep this letter focused on what you can do to prepare for class over the summer: READ!

Reading is one of the most important skills you will ever learn. I realize some of you struggle with reading and the thought of reading over the summer sounds *horrible*. So, think about these facts before you protest:

- You missed out on a big chunk of the 2019-2020 school year.
- We don't know what the 2020-2021 school year holds for any of us. We can only guess.
- Students forget things and lose skills over breaks (summer, winter, spring, and COVID).
- Your education is important.
- You become a better reader with practice.
- No one has ever died from reading. If you don't believe me, research it and then send me your findings.
- You start the class with a good grade! (Yes, summer reading is for a grade!)

Book Option 1: Wishtree by Katherine Applegate

If you need a friendly book that isn't too long nor too short, then this may be the one! It is written on about a 4th grade level. It's about 220 pages.

Red is an oak tree who is many rings old. Red is the neighborhood "wishtree"—people write their wishes on pieces of cloth and tie them to Red's branches. Along with a crow named Bongo and other animals who seek refuge in Red's hollows, this wishtree watches over the neighborhood.

Book Option 2: The Graveyard Book by Neil Gaiman

This one is a little longer, but it is a favorite of mine as well as former students. It's written on about a 5th grade level. This book is 320 pages.

Synopsis:

Nobody Owens, known as Bod, is a normal boy. There are adventures in the graveyard for a boy—an ancient Indigo Man, a gateway to the abandoned city of ghouls, the strange and terrible Sleer. But if Bod leaves the graveyard, he will be in danger from the man Jack—who has already killed Bod's family.
