Kindergarten Social Studies: Rules, Responsibility, and Authority What is Authority?


Authority is the power to give orders or make decisions. People who have authority make sure people are following the rules. Just as the rules are different in different places, everyone does not have the same authority. For example, when you play sports the referee has the authority to make sure everyone plays fair and follows the rules. Police officers have authority to make sure you follow the rules and laws of your community. A referee cannot arrest someone who breaks the law, and a police officer cannot call you out for three strikes.

What is Respect?

Respect means treating someone kindly and listening to them. We show respect to the people who have authority by following the rules and listening to them when we break the rules. Everyone deserves respect. Many **community helpers** have authority to enforce rules and laws that keep us safe.

Task

Make community helper trading cards! Draw their pictures and write their names on the cards. What would happen if no one had authority? Talk to a family member about your thoughts.
