# Course Overview

The Knox County 6<sup>th</sup> Grade Social Studies Curriculum consists of World History and Geography: Early Civilizations through the Decline of the Roman Empire. (5<sup>th</sup> century C.E.) The curriculum focuses on the development of civilizations. The study of ancient civilizations includes the impact of geography, early history, cultural development, and economic change. The geographic focus will include the study of physical and political features, economic development, resources, and migration patterns. Students will analyze text like a historian using appropriate informational texts and primary sources incorporating writing strategies within the curriculum. Students will be learning about world religions in 6<sup>th</sup> grade curriculum. In Module 2, 3, 7, and 8 we are studying polytheism with Sumerian, Egyptian, Greek, and Roman gods and goddesses. We are studying Judaism (Module 4), Hinduism (Module 5), Buddhism (Module 6), and Christianity (Module 8).

**Textbook**: *My World* by Frank Karpiel, Kathleen Krull, and Grant Wiggins **Materials**: 2 Spiral Notebooks, Folder or Binder to hold materials passed out in class.
