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**Dual Enrollment Grant:**

1. In order to receive a Dual Enrollment Grant, students must apply for the dual enrollment grant (<https://www.tn.gov/content/tn/collegepays/tsac-student-portal.html>)

A student qualifies to receive the Dual Enrollment Grant for one course per semester by meeting the admission requirements of the institution the student plans to attend.

To receive funding for up to two (2) additional courses per semester, the student must meet the minimum HOPE Scholarship academic requirements at the time of dual enrollment (21 ACT or unweighted cumulative GPA 3.0). For more details, please see the [Tennessee HOPE Scholarship](#) academic requirements.

2. Dual enrollment students enrolled in high-need courses or programs as part of the Governor's Investment in Vocational Education (GIVE) Act may receive higher funding amounts for up to four (4) courses under the following limitations
  - Funding does not exceed the cost of maintenance fees established for community colleges by the state university and community college system.
3. Students may receive Dual Enrollment Grant funding for up to ten (10) courses over their junior and senior years. *Students who receive funding for more than four (4) dual enrollment courses will have all amounts awarded for courses five (5) through ten (10) reduced from their Tennessee HOPE Scholarship on a dollar for dollar basis.*
4. College courses attempted and the number of years enrolled as a dual enrollment student **shall not count** against the statutory limitations of 120 semester hours or five (5) years for the Tennessee HOPE Scholarship program.
5. At 2-year and 4-year postsecondary institutions, the Dual Enrollment Grant shall not be used for upper division courses (generally numbered 300-400 or 3000-4000).

### **Dual Enrollment Grant Award Amounts at Eligible Two-Year and Four-Year Postsecondary Institutions**

#### Non-GIVE Act Funding

- Students in dual enrollment courses that are not considered "high-need" may receive the following:
  - Up to \$500 for course 1
  - Up to \$500 for course 2
  - Up to \$200 for course 3 (Student will pay the difference)
  - No Award for course 4 (Student will pay for the course)
  - Up to \$100 per credit hour for courses 5 - 10
- Example: At Pellissippi for courses 5-10, grant covers \$300 for course; student is responsible for \$198 per class, courses 5-10 plus books, fees)

#### **GIVE Act Funding (See italicized class codes below for GIVE Act courses @ Pellissippi)**

- Dual enrollment students may receive up to \$510 per course for any four (4) [high-need courses](#) as part of the GIVE Act.
- Dual Enrollment Grant funding for high-need courses beyond four (4) may be awarded up to \$100 per credit hour, not to exceed funding for ten (10) lifetime courses.
